Nabokov's Metamorphosis In Gogol and Kafka the absurd central character belongs to the absurd world around him but, pathetically and tragically, attempts to struggle out of it into the world of humans—and dies in despair In Stevenson the unreal central character belongs to a brand of unreality different from that of the world around him
